Kia ora Bianka,

Welcome to Treetop Tales, a roundup of news, advice, events and the latest happenings at BirdCare Aotearoa – especially for our wonderful supporters.

We've had an extremely busy start to the year, with **over 2,700 admissions** so far. As the baby bird season draws to an end, most baby birds have fledged. However, this season not only started earlier but is also ending later than usual, so we still have a few juveniles in care.

We've admitted over **600 birds with botulism** since January and are continuing to see botulism cases as we enter Autumn. And to top it off, we've just passed the peak of **tītī (Cook's petrel)** admissions!

A record baby season

The 2021-22 baby bird season has been our busiest yet. Our **native nursery** saw the likes of tūī, tauhou (silvereye), kōtare (kingfisher), ruru (morepork), moho pererū (banded rail), warou (welcome swallow), pūkeko,

masked lapwing/spur-winged plover, matuku moana (white-faced heron), and poaka (pied stilt). Our **non-native nursery** cared for blackbirds, song thrush, starlings, finches, sparrows, quails, pheasants, doves, pigeons and ducklings, among others.

While the species we admit vary slightly from year to year, the main reasons for admission remain the same: **cat interaction** (over 1,650 in 2021 and over 350 in the first 2.5 months of 2022) and **well-intentioned bird-napping**.

You helped over 600 birds with botulism

With your support, we've cared for hundreds of botulism birds since late 2021. Species affected have included **mallards**, **pūtangitangi** (paradise

duck), **tētē** (grey teal), **coot**, **tōrea** (oystercatcher), **matuku moana** (heron), **poaka** (pied stilt), and more.

These birds receive veterinary care, medication (antibiotics, pain relief, and eye drops as needed), fluid therapy, and time to recover before they're returned to the wild.

Thank you for helping grounded tītī take flight

A huge thank you to everyone who looked out for, rescued, transported, and helped release **tītī (Cook's petrels)** this year. **Special thanks** to our Bethells Beach and Mercer Bay release teams.

Cook's petrels fly over Auckland from their breeding ground on Te Hauturu-o-Toi (Little Barrier Island) on their way to the Tasman Sea, and many become disorientated by **light pollution**. They need specific conditions to take flight, so once they are grounded in the city, they will only survive if collected, checked, and relocated.

We admitted over 150 of these beautiful little seabirds **between February and May**. At BirdCare Aotearoa, the Cook's petrels receive a full veterinary check-up and medications if needed (all receive daily vitamins and sporanox, and some also need painkillers, antibiotics, and eye drops). They receive

fluid therapy, their feather condition is assessed, and they are given a waterproofing bath if needed. They are assisted fed a specialised diet until they are a suitable weight for release. Finally, they are released at a suitable location by our dedicated volunteer team.

It costs hundreds of dollars every day to care for these precious endemic birds. We couldn't do it without your support!

Patient spotlight: pāpango beak reconstruction



This little pāpango (New Zealand scaup) came in with a fractured beak. His tongue was sticking out and he couldn't feed. Clinical Director, Dani Najera, amputated a small part of the beak and placed a fixer to keep the beak in place while it healed. The scaup completed a course of antibiotics, doubled his weight, and was released after making a full recovery.

A feast for a kākā



This gorgeous kākā (brown parrot) was admitted to our hospital after flying into a window. Thankfully, she experienced no major injuries and soon she

was chatting away and snacking on lots of tasty treats (fruits, vegetables, insects, seeds, grains, and leaves).

She was released locally and has since been spotted sitting in the treetops!

If you want to prevent birds from hitting your windows, you can **create a visual barrier using specialised window stickers**. Window strikes are often fatal, but thankfully quite avoidable.

Arataki Junior Rangers raise over \$900

The Arataki Junior Rangers is a programme to **inspire young people** to become passionate about our regional parks and enable them to actively make a difference in their local areas. As a group of 8- to 12-year-olds, they focus on all aspects of **local flora and fauna conservation**, including planting days and predator control.

Each year, the Junior Rangers choose one non-profit or volunteer group within the Waitākere Ranges to support. Last year, they chose to support BirdCare Aotearoa by running a raffle over the Christmas/New Year period. They managed to raise **over \$900!** We were delighted to be able to invite them to the centre to hand over their donation.

This juvenile takapu (Australasian gannet) arrived weak and slightly skinny. He was also experiencing some gastrointestinal issues. After a few weeks in care, he was feeling much better! His strength returned, his appetite became quite astonishing, his waterproofing was restored, and he loved pool time.

We were thrilled to watch this young one return to the wild at Muriwai. He

made a beeline for the other juveniles and settled right in.

We've partnered with Kiwi social enterprise, [Supergenerous](#) – a platform automating your donation rebate claims and helping get rebates back to charities like us. Supergenerous is licensed by the IRD and it only takes a few minutes to sign up. (It's free to sign up but Supergenerous takes a fee of 10% + GST, if they secure a donation rebate for you).
